Sonia, who is deaf and relies on hearing aids and lipreading to communicate says that she wouldn't be where she is today without the support of NESS. "When I came to NESS, I was lost, confused, stressed, not sure what to do and with a small baby.

I had lost confidence and couldn't see a future". Sonia was determined that she wanted to give her daughter a better life. With support from NESS, Sonia is now working in a job that she enjoys and feels confident and independent. "NESS gave me the confidence to go to college, to stand up for myself and believe that I could do it.

They helped me to fill in applications for benefits that I was entitled to but didn't know about. They supported me through college and got me work experience."



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"They helped with hearing equipment at home and at work. They have kept in touch and kept encouraging me. NESS has transformed life for me and my daughter - a happy mother means a happy daughter".

Our Mission: "Achieving independence for blind and deaf people".

North East Sensory Services supports people with serious sight and/or hearing loss to overcome practical and emotional challenges and achieve independence."



In 1879, NESS started as the Aberdeen Town and County Association for Teaching the Blind in their Homes.

In 1980, the organisation became Grampian Society for the Blind.

In 2010, our name was changed to North East Sensory Services (NESS) to reflect our new identity as a provider of joint sensory services.

Today we support around 6,500 visually and/or hearing impaired people of all ages, their families and carers across Aberdeen city, Aberdeenshire, Moray, Angus and Dundee.

This area covers roughly one sixth of the land mass and one tenth of the population of Scotland.



Jim's Story

Jim has volunteered organising our postal library since 2010.

"I send out audio books to people who are blind or partially sighted who are not able to visit our audiobook library. I send out the discs, organise new disc copies, process the returns and address any queries. Audio books are vital to people who are visually impaired, particularly if they are isolated and no longer able to read", explains Jim.

"Volunteering at NESS is great for me. I'm not able to work because I suffer from depression and anxiety, but volunteering with NESS keeps me busy and so keeps me well. I can come in when I'm able to and take time out when I need it. It gets me up and dressed in the morning, and gets me working, otherwise I'd be sitting doing nothing. The people at NESS are really nice and understand my depression and anxiety".

NESS has statutory contracts with four health and social care partnerships to provide social work and rehabilitation support.

In addition, we also undertake a number of **Added Value Services** funded from charitable and trust funded income. These have been developed to meet what we have identified as our service users' specific and often complex needs, which were not being met by any other provision.


How are these vital services funded?

The range of services, products, supports and information are first class.

Our services include:

Connect, Include and Support (CIS), providing peer support, social and activity groups for socially isolated older people;

Young People's Sensory Service (YPSS), helping children and young people develop and enhance their confidence.

Employment Service, providing support to help people of working age find training or employment, become job ready and either enter or remain in the job market;

Welfare Service, assisting people to apply for/sustain benefit entitlements and to avoid financial hardship;


ICT for all, offering a wide range of accessible, technology-awareness skills and training;

Hospital Information Officer, providing practical and emotional support to individuals and their families at the point of diagnosis;

Sensory Awareness Training, raising awareness of the practical, social and emotional impact of sight and/or hearing loss and increasing confidence in those supporting people with sensory impairment;

Transcription and Recording Services, enabling us to communicate with our service users in a variety of accessible formats.

Our Vision:

"A Society in which people living with a sensory loss are able to fully participate and contribute to the same level as those without a sensory loss."

- One in six of the population has some degree of hearing loss and this number will rise to 1 in 5 in the next 20 years; 57,000 people are severely deaf.
 - In Scotland, 7,000 Deaf people use British Sign Language as their first or preferred language.
 - One in 30 (188,000 people in Scotland) has a significant sight loss, which rises to 1 in 5 of people over the age of 75. Numbers are expected to double by 2031.
 - In Scotland, nearly 3,500 children have a hearing loss, while there are 2,500 children and young people living with a significant sight loss.
 - 5,000 people are known to be deafblind and a significant number of older people are living with both a sight loss and hearing loss that significantly affects them day to day.
